2014 MINUTES FRIDAY MORNING

The one hundred and forty fifth annual session of the Central Indiana Association of Separate Baptist in Christ, Inc. convened at the Midway Campground on Friday, September 12th, 2014 at 10:00 AM. The moderator, Rev. Donnie Wiggington asked Bro. Dan Sink to lead the body in prayer. Bro. Donnie welcomed all in attendance and asked all to feel welcome. Rev. Rick Owensby led the congregation in singing "Come and Dine" & "Glory to His Name" while Sis. Mary Ann Sink played the piano.

The moderator asked Bro. Bill Ridge to come forward to lead the devotional service. Bro. Bill read from Deuteronomy 4:1-8 & Luke 21:25-33. Prayer requests were made by the congregation and Rev. Eddie Freeman led in an altar of prayer.

The moderator asked Lilly, Isaiah & Morgan Perkins and Merci Satter to lead the congregation in the pledges to the American and Christian Flags, and the Holy Bible. The moderator asked that all standing delegates from the Central Indiana Association, which include all Ministers, Deacons, and Sunday School Superintendents, to stand in order to constitute a quorum. A total of 31 standing delegates were present. The moderator asked the standing delegates if they will work with one another during this setting of the association.

- The letters from each of the following churches were read, East Columbus, Franklin, Edinburgh, Friendship Decatur (Rodney), Great Hope, Indianapolis, Jewell Village, Midway, Mount Zion, Pleasant Valley, Salem, Shiloh and Union Laymon. A motion was made after the reading of each letter to accept it, print the necessary information in the minutes, and seat the delegate(s) present and those who may come in later. Each motion was seconded and passed. The delegates were recognized after each letter was read and were seated in fellowship by the moderator.
- The moderator asked for unanimous consent to appoint an assistant moderator in Bro. Jimmy Polstons absence. Consent being given the moderator appointed Bro. Jimmie McGaha.
- The moderator asked all delegate, standing and lay delegates to stand and asked Rev. Eddie Freeman to ask God's blessing on this association.
- The moderator called for new churches. There were none.
- The appointment of the Divine Services Committee was then made. This committee consisted of Bro. Dan Sink (Chairman), Bro. Bill Ridge & Sis. Marie Roberts.
- All visiting ministers and deacons were asked to stand to be recognized.
 The visitors included Bro. Charles Jordan, Bro. Rick Goff, and Rev. Jim
 Goff from the Nolynn Association. Bro. Donnie welcomed each visitor and
 thanked them for their support.
- Bro. Donnie called for an offering (designated to go to the kitchen committee) be taken up. Rev. Jim Stump asked the blessing on the offering which amounted to \$184.00. The congregation sang "Revive Us Again.

The moderator then spoke of the tragedy of 9/11 mentioning where he was when he heard of the attacks. He asked Rev. Lonzo Wiggington to speak toward remembrance of all those lost in the 9/11 tragedy. He read 1 Timothy 2:1-4 mentioning we need to pray for our leaders. Bro. Lonzo led in prayer for active service personnel and their families.

Bro. Donnie spoke to how the preaching is his favorite part of the association. He then asked Rev. Homer Whited to come forward and preach the introductory sermon. Bro. Homer greeted everyone and mentioned he has been blessed to attend about 58 associations. Bro Homer stated he desired the anointing of the Spirit of God to assist in this sermon. He mentioned how the Lord has blessed him during the amputation of his thumb due to cancer.

Bro. Homer read Luke 7:19-23 and asked Rev. Rick Owensby to pray for God's blessing on the sermon. Bro. Homer spoke of the supporters of the ministry in the reading and in today's church. There is one way to heaven which is the Lord Jesus Christ and we need to be teaching that every day. If what we are speaking is not Jesus we should cast it aside and preach Jesus. We cannot separate ourselves from sinners but must share Jesus with them. We need not get bogged down spiritually when problems arise in our lives. Hold to the promises of God to see us thru life because eternal life in heaven is worth the wait and issues of this life. We must carry on in the work until our time to cross death's river comes. The Lord is compassionate toward us. He will be there when family & friends forsake us. God cares for us more than we ever realize. Peace will come when we get to heaven where there will be no sickness, sorrow, pain or death. The greatest portion of the scripture read in Bro. Homers mind is "to the poor the gospel is preached". Sis. Megan Sink – Missionary

From June 1 to June 9, I spent time spreading God's Word to the people of Carrefour-feuilles, Haiti. I was a part of a team of 12 fellow Christians ranging in ages from 18 to mid-fifties. The organization we were a part of is called Mission Journeys, and it is based out of Lexington, Kentucky. We stayed in a compound that included not only our sleeping arrangements and a kitchen, but also the church we worked at all week. We were hosted by Dr. Jean Marcel Sule, a dentist and OB/GYN, who was also the pastor of the Carrefour-feuilles Church of Christ, the church we worked at. Our work for the week included construction-type work like carrying buckets of gravel, rock, and water to help make concrete. The concrete was then used to help finish walls and ceilings in some of the rooms of Dr. Sule's church and clinic. Our work would begin at about 7 am. After lunch we would start preparing for vacation bible school. which took place each afternoon starting at 3 pm until about 5 pm. Vacation bible school each day consisted of singing several songs, teaching the children a memory verse in their native language, Haitian Creole, teaching them a Bible lesson, doing a craft, and singing again before sending them off to their homes. At the beginning of the week, we started with about 50 kids. By the end of the week, we were able to witness to about 200 children and adults alike. While the children were having their lesson inside each night, there was a lesson taught to the young adults outside the church. The two preachers who were on our team helped teach the adult class, along with some of the elders of the church. After vacation bible school and dinner each night, we would have devotional/prayer time on the roof of the church. We would share what God had revealed to us on that day, as well as sing a few worship songs and pray. Evening devotional time was probably my favorite part of the day, second to vacation bible school. Our work and vacation bible schedule remained the same from Monday to Friday. On Saturday, we traveled about three hours up in the mountains to a village named Dufailly. This village was very primitive compared to the city where we had been all week. While in Dufailly, we visited the orphanage and saw the house that the missionaries stay at. We were able to see much of the country on that day. On Sunday, we attended Sunday school and the worship service. The service was very spiritual, and lasted several hours. We also attended church in the evening, much like we do here in the United States. During the entire nine days, we were very blessed to be able to share the Gospel will several hundred Haitian people. We had a great group of young translators, and our mission team had great chemistry, feeling like a family. There is still much work to be done in Haiti, and I pray that God willing, I will return again. I want to especially thank the Central Indiana Separate Baptist Mission Board and the First Separate Baptist Church of Franklin for their monetary support, as well as thank everyone who supported me through prayer and the many other ways. Bondye bon (God is good). May God bless you all.

ARTICLES OF DOCTRINE

- 1. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the infallible Word of God and the only safe rule of faith and practice, using the King James version of the Holy Bible. * II Tim. 3:16-17; I Cor. 10:11; II Peter 1:20-21
- 2. That there is in the God-Head three divine personages; Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit. I John 5:7; Matt. 28:19; Matt. 3:15-17
- 3. That man is in a fallen state before God, and is unable to liberate himself by any ability we possess by nature. Isa. 63:1-5; I Cor. 15:22; Ps. 51:5; John 14:6
- 4. That salvation, regeneration, justification, sanctification and redemption are through faith in the life, death, resurrection, ascension, and intercession of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. John 17:19; Acts 13:39; Titus 2:14; Rom. 3:24-26
- 5. We believe that he who endures to the end the same shall be saved. Rev. 2:10; Matt. 24:13
- 6. That the joys of the righteous and punishment of the wicked will be eternal. Matt. 25:46; Dan. 12:2; Rom. 5:21
- 7. We believe that baptism, the Lord's Supper and feet washing are ordinances of Jesus Christ, appointed in the Church, and none but true believers are proper subjects, and the only proper mode of baptism is immersion of believers. Matt. 28:19-20; Acts 2:41; John 13:14; I Peter 3:21; Matt. 3:14; I Cor. 11:23-26
- 8. We believe in the sanctity of the first day of the week or Lord's Day, which ought to be observed and spent in public or private worship of God and that we should abstain from worldly concerns except in cases of necessity or mercy. Acts 20:7; I Cor. 16:2
- 9. We believe in the resurrection of the body, both of the just and the unjust, but every man to his own order. Those who have done good, to the resurrection of life, and those who have done evil to the resurrection of damnation, and that God hath appointed a day in which He will judge the world in righteousness by Jesus Christ. - 10. That it is our duty to be tender and affectionate one to another and in honor preferring one another, to study the happiness of God's people in general and do all we can to support, promote, and spread the Gospel. Rom. 12:10; Luke 14:23
- 11. We believe that Jesus Christ, by the grace of God, tasted death for everyone, and that all may partake of his Divine benefits through repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Also, infants and those who have never developed the mental ability to receive regeneration, are included in the covenant of God's grace. John 3:15-17; Acts 4:12

CONSTITUTION

THE PREAMBLE

The name of this Association shall be called the Central Indiana Association of Separate Baptist in Christ, Incorporated, and we agree to be governed by the following Constitution:

ARTICLE I

Section 1. This body shall be composed of lay delegates sent from different churches, and Ministers, Deacons and the Sunday School Superintendents from Sunday Schools of the churches comprising the body, if they are members of the Separate Baptist Church.

Section 2. Each church comprising the body of this Association shall be entitled to 2 lay delegates for the first 25 members or fraction thereof; one lay delegate for each additional 25 members or fraction thereof.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall include the following: Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer, who shall be elected and hold their office one associational year, and a Board of Trustees composed of five members selected by vote of delegates appointed by the churches; each church to be allowed one delegate. No church is to have more than one Association Trustee serving at one time. If a trustee is from your church he will automatically be the voting delegate when the new trustee is to be elected. The Chairman of the Trustees will preside over the meeting. Members of the first Board of Trustees shall serve 1,2,3,4 and 5 years respectively. Thereafter, each member shall be elected for five years, one members term of office to expire at each annual session.

Section 2. The duties of the Moderator shall be to preside at all meetings, be it either business or divine worship, and to appoint all committees except the Constitutional Committee, and to cast the deciding vote in case of a tie.

Section 3. The Assistant Moderator shall perform all duties of the Moderator in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 4. The duties of the Clerk shall be to make complete written record of the proceedings of all meetings of this body and keep a file record of the same, and carry on all correspondence.

Section 5. The duties of the Assistant Clerk shall be to perform the duties of the Clerk in the absence of the Clerk.

Section 6. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to receive all money and pay out the same upon order of the Trustees.

Section 7. The duties of the Assistant Treasurer shall be to perform the duties of the Treasurer in case the Treasurer is not able to perform his duties or is deceased.

Section 8. The duties of the Board of Trustees shall be to decide all questions arising under the constitution and by-laws of the association and to have the responsibility of the care and upkeep of all associational properties.

ARTICLE III

This body shall meet once each year (or more often) if called by the Moderator.

ARTICLE IV

No delegate shall absent himself from this body while in session without permission from the Moderator.

ARTICLE V

No person has the right to perform the Ordinance of God's House unless legally ordained according to the mode adopted by the Separate Baptist Association.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. This association shall have a Mission Board consisting of five members. The members of this Board, shall be appointed by the Moderator.

Sections 2. The duties of the Mission Board shall be to solicit the support of our churches and ministers, and to organize new churches and Sunday Schools. The churches of the association shall raise a fund necessary for this. The Mission Board shall solicit each church for support.

Section 3. The duties of the Mission Board shall be also to take care of any mission money sent in by the different churches.

ARTICLE VII

Section 1. This body shall have a Presbytery composed of five ordained ministers appointed by the moderator.

Section 2. The duties of the Presbytery shall be to attend the examination and ordination of all candidates for the ministry and deacons in the churches.

Section 3. If any church of this association wishes to ordain a deacon, they shall notify the Presbytery by letter, not less than three members of the Presbytery shall be present to examine the candidate and if found worthy to set apart or ordain. The Presbytery then may, if needed, ask any ordained personnel of this association to assist in the ordination only at which time the candidate shall be given a certificate of ordination.

Section 4. The qualifications required of those seeking ordination to the ministry are set forth in the by-laws of this association. The duties of the board shall extend from one session to another, and said board shall make a report at each meeting.

ARTICLE VIII

This association shall have a Young Peoples Department, to be known as the Young Peoples Separate Baptist Union. Its officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. It will include all the Young Peoples Separate Baptist Unions of the association and will hold at least one meeting a year for the purpose of promoting the Young Peoples Work. Other meetings may be held upon call by the President. All officers shall be elected at the regular annual meeting. The Union may draft its own bylaws, but no by-laws shall be accepted which will conflict with or be in disagreement with the belief of the Separate Baptist Church. Said Young Peoples Separate Baptist Union shall make a report at each association.

ARTICLE IX

This constitution, By-Laws and Articles of Doctrine may be changed or amended by a two-thirds vote of the association after an amendment has been submitted by a committee selected by the association for that purpose and after having been tabled for a period of one associational year. All amendments shall be submitted to the committee before being voted upon by the association. Said committee shall be composed of three members elected by the associational delegates. Members of the first Constitutional Committee shall serve one, two, three years respectively. Thereafter, each member shall be elected for three years, one members' term of office to expire at each annual association.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

Any church applying for membership in this body by letter or delegate shall be requested to give evidence of orthodoxy and agree to comply with the rules of this body before being received.

ARTICLE II

When any minister seeks membership in this body, or licentiate seeks ordination, his church shall notify the Presbytery by letter, the Presbytery shall be appointed at each association. Not less than three members of the Presbytery shall be present to examine him on his faith and doctrine, his standing in the church to which he belongs, his ability to expound the Gospel, and his educational qualifications. Any minister shall be licensed for two years before being set apart or ordained by the Presbytery. Then if found in complete accord with the association's Article of Doctrine, able to intelligently expound the Gospel, and worthy, then the Presbytery may if needed ask any ordained personnel of this association to assist in ordination only.

ARTICLE III

Should any church or any member minister of this body fail to report to this body, the Presbytery shall investigate the cause of such failure and report the same to the association.

If any minister fails to report to the association or fails to pick up his minister's card within 2 years, they shall be placed on file with the association papers.

ARTICLE IV

When more than one candidate is nominated for any office in the association, the election shall be by ballot.

ARTICLE V

This body shall have the power to expel any church, minister, deacon, pastor or member from membership in the body for heterodoxy and disorderly conduct, and shall demand the surrender of credentials to the association. No church shall employ a minister as pastor who is not identified with the Separate Baptist Church, except in case of shortage of ministers, and then only by and with the consent and approval of the Presbytery. Said ministers so employed shall sign an agreement that their preaching shall be in accord with the Articles of Doctrine adopted by this body during his pastorate. The Separate Baptist Church is opposed to the doctrine of sanctification as a second definite work of grace and a thousand years literal reign of Christ, and will not permit its being preached in its churches.

ARTICLE VI

In case of a discussion with any church of this body, and inability of the members of such church to settle such discussion, any member of such church shall have the privilege of calling upon the Board of Trustees of this body, and not upon the association, for settlement, upon giving due notice to the church of said appeal from the decision of such church to said board. The board shall take such action as it shall see fit and necessary in the case. Any member or church, if dissatisfied with the decision and action of the board, may appeal the decision of said board to the association.

ARTICLE VII

It shall be the duty of the moderator of each church body to remind the church body to support the Central Indiana Association and Mission Board with their financial aid.

ARTICLE VIII

The clerk shall receive one hundred dollars annually for his/her services as clerk and shall draw on the treasury to defray expenses in the printing and distribution of the minutes of the association.

ARTICLE IX

No officer of this association shall hold the same office more than five years in succession.

ARTICLE X

All elected and appointed officers of this association shall serve the time for which they are elected and until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

ARTICLE XI

This association may act prudently as protectorate for a limited time toward any church of this association which fails to have any meetings.

ARTICLE XII

This association shall not issue minister cards to licentiate ministers.

ARTICLE XIII

This association forbids the ordination of women as ministers of this body.

ARTICLE XIV

This association prohibits the ordination of homosexuals as ministers or deacons of this body, Also, no person shall be ordained who has more than one living wife or whose wife has more than one living husband.

RULES OF PROCEDURE

- 1. This association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. All officers of this association shall be elected by a majority vote of delegates present. No one shall be allowed to vote by proxy.
- 3. All nominations of officers shall be by delegates.
- 4. Only members who presented the motion under discussion may speak more than once upon the motion, except when he be given permission by the moderator.
- 5. Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the moderator and when given permission to speak, must adhere strictly to the subject without casting any reflections upon any previous speaker.
- 6. No person shall be interrupted when speaking as long as he adheres to the rules and decorum of the association and is casting light upon the subject.
- 7. Any delegate shall have a right to rise to a point of order any time one speaking is thought out of order by the objector. When recognized by the moderator, the objector may state his point of order. The moderator's decision on the point of order shall be final, unless appealed to the body.
- Creating disturbances, speaking harshly to a brother, sowing discord, talking off the subject under discussion, or any act creating disturbances, shall be considered out of order.
- 9. There must be at least twenty delegates present to constitute a quorum.
- 10. All grievances or complaints that come before the association shall be heard by a committee appointed by the moderator and approved by association. Said committee shall immediately hear the evidence on the complaint or grievance and immediately report their decision to the association. Said decision shall be final unless an appeal is taken to the association.
- 11. Where these rules fail to provide, the moderator shall be governed by "Robert's Rules of Order."
- 12. These rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present at the regular association.

RULES & GUIDELINES FOR YOUTH CAMP

Last revised September 10, 2004

- No Camper shall be permitted to leave the campgrounds without the permission of the committee.
- 2. All campers must stay out of the woods and stay on the playground.
- 3. Each camper will be under the supervision of his or her teacher.
- 4. There will be no smoking while at the campground.
- 5. All girls must wear dresses or skirts to a length no higher than the knees.
- 6. Slacks will not be permitted for girls.
- 7. Boys must wear sleeved shirts and long pants.
- 8. Shorts will not be permitted for any camper.

MINISTERS AND DEACONS INSTITUTE CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The name of this association shall be the Ministers and Deacons Institute of Central Indiana Association of Separate Baptists in Christ.

Article I

This body shall be composed of all pastors, licentiate/ordained ministers and ordained deacons of the Central Indiana Association of Separate Baptist Churches.

Article II

- Section 1. The officers of this body shall be a Chairman, Assistant Chairman, Secretary/Treasurer and Assistant Secretary/Treasurer, who shall be elected and shall hold this office one year.
- Section 2. No member shall be allowed to serve in the same office more than two consecutive years.
 - Section 3. All committees shall be appointed by the chairman.
- Section 4. The Secretary/Treasurer shall make a complete written record of each meeting and keep on file, carry on all correspondence, and keep a record of receipts and expenditures.

Article III

This body shall meet on the third Friday night before the Fifth Sunday Meeting @ $7:00~\mathrm{p.m.}$

Article IV

- Section 1. This institute shall have a program committee of two members of the Institute.
- Section 2. The committee will have the responsibility of providing a program that will be acceptable to the chairman and pastor of the host church.

Article V

No one shall be eligible to make motions or speak in the business meeting except pastors, licentiate/ordained ministers or ordained deacons of the Central Indiana Separate Baptist Churches.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S SEPARATE BAPTIST UNION BY-LAWS JULY 14, 1991

- 1. The purpose of YPSBU is to gather the Central Indiana Association Young People together for worship and fellowship and to encourage young people to attend church and to be Christians.
- 2. The YPSBU will have quarterly meetings to be held in accordance with YPSBU President
- 3. Officers for the YPSBU will be elected annually at the second quarterly meeting.
- **4**. No officer is to hold the same office for more than three (3) consecutive years.
- 5. Officers for YPSBU will be as follows:

President - conducts quarterly meetings and appoints committee.

<u>Vice-President</u> - assist President; hold the position of President in the absence of the President.

<u>Secretary and Treasurer</u> - record minutes of meetings; control bank account; handle any correspondence.

<u>Assistant Secretary and Treasurer</u> - assist Secretary and Treasurer; hold office in their absence.

Song Leader - lead congregational singing at YPSBU quarterly meetings.

<u>Assistant Song Leader</u> - assist Song Leader; hold office of Song Leader in their absence.

- **6.** Each quarterly YPSBU meeting will have a program for Young People especially designed by a program committee.
- 7. There will be a program committee of three members (or one church) appointed by the President at each quarterly meeting. They will be responsible for the following quarterly program.
- **8**. Young People from the ages 10-45 will be eligible to vote in business if they attend one of the Central Indiana Association Churches.
- **9**. The by-laws can be amended by two-thirds majority vote at the YPSBU quarterly meeting.
